

17. **Dutch Reformed Church:** *The Dutch Reformed Church was built by acclaimed architect George Post. 23 Church Street.*

18. **High Bridge Methodist Church:** *This church has an easily recognizable tall steeple. 36 Church Street.*

19. **High Bridge Middle School:** *More than 100 years old, this building once housed grades K-12. 50 Thomas Street.*

20. **Mill Street:** *A key street with several distinctive homes linking High Bridge's center to the Taylor-Wharton Foundry.*

21. **TISCO Complex:** *Taylor-Wharton's administration building and Shop E are now owned by the borough. Near Union Forge Park.*

22. **Taylor-Wharton Iron and Steel:** *This factory complex, which made munitions for the Revolutionary War, was crucially important in shaping High Bridge's history. 3 Washington Avenue.*

23. **Firehouse:** *The brave volunteers of the fire company, formed in 1899, are some of High Bridge's own heroes. 7 Maryland Avenue.*

25. **Lake Solitude:** *A historic lake created by Taylor-Wharton to power the factory. Off River Road.*

26. **Union Forge:** *The original iron forge that led to High Bridge's eventual settlement. 7 River Road.*

27. **Solitude House:** *Built for the manager of Union Forge, it served as a prison for John Penn, the last colonial governor of Pennsylvania, during the Revolutionary War. 7 River Road.*

28. **The Annex at Solitude:** *This small building once housed a supply store for the community. 7 River Road.*

29. **Greystone:** *A beautiful historic mansion built by one of the Taylor-Wharton presidents. 21 Nassau Road.*

30. **L. H. Taylor House:** *Built by Archibald Taylor, this was a major farm in High Bridge. At the end of Springside Lane.*

31. **Springside Farm:** *This farm housed Union Forge's animals and has many old buildings. At the end of Springside Lane.*

32. **East Main Street homes:** *East Main was once the main street for the village of East High Bridge and it has many historic homes.*

33. **Silverthorne School:** *Now a home, the borough's first school was moved here. 61 Dewey Avenue.*

34. **Arch Street School:** *This was High Bridge's second school and is now a residence. 13-15 Arch Street.*

35. **Arch Street Row houses:** *These three buildings each have four one-family units that were built by Taylor-Wharton for its employees. 31-53 Arch Street.*

36. **The Arches:** *The most famous landmark in High Bridge, its namesake is concealed here. On Arch Street.*

37. **The Croghan Home:** *One of the oldest houses in High Bridge. 150 Fairview Avenue.*

Key to the Map of Locations:

1. **Cregar Homestead & Bank House:** *The original home of the Cregar family, one of the first High Bridge families. 97 North Main Street.*
2. **Central New Jersey Railroad:** *Railway system that was crucial to the growth of High Bridge. The Commons on Main Street offers parking.*
3. **Borough Hall:** *Century-old home of borough offices. 71 Main Street.*
4. **Fitzgerald Architecture:** *Historic Main Street store front. 67 Main Street.*
5. **Saint Joseph's Church:** *The borough's Roman Catholic Church has a cornerstone dating back to 724. 59 Main Street.*
- 6&7. **Riverside Liquors & Rialto Theater:** *The former bank is now a store and its parking lot was the location of the Rialto Theater. 45 Main*



8. **Circa:** Now a restaurant, the building has long been an important Main Street business. 37 Main Street.

9. **American Hotel:** Site of the borough's first hotel, where George Washington may have slept. Corner of Main and McDonald Streets.

10. **Train Station:** This building was important to the railroads, which were crucial to High Bridge. Off Union Avenue.

11. **Union Hotel:** One of High Bridge's two former places of lodging. End of Union Avenue.

12. **High Bridge Hills Golf Course:** One of High Bridge's oldest farms is today an excellent golf course. 203 Cregar Road.

13&14. **Cregar Farm & Lime Kiln:** The site of the Cregar Farm & its kiln. This kiln was very important to area farms. 116-118 Cregar Road.

15. **Fairview Avenue houses:** Several historic homes line Fairview Avenue (Route 513).

16. **Mine Road:** The iron mines here were critical to the iron industry in High Bridge.
